Several factors that increase a bill's chance of becoming law include bill authored by legislators in the majority party (Democrats control the House and Republicans control the Senate) and having a companion bill (a version in both the House and Senate). Bills written by the chairs of the education committees have a very high chance of making progress (Davnie (finance) and Richardson (policy) in the House and Chamberlain in the Senate). Bills not heard in committee tend to die.
